
most. From 2023 to 2024 we recorded a 16% increase in the number of babies and children who directly benefitted from Archie's support. This is undoubtedly a sign of the challenging times we live in but it also points to increased awareness about Archie services, meaning more and more families know who to turn to in their time of need. The hospitals we support welcomed approximately 50,000 children through their doors last year and with a steady stream of new requests for help, Archie support and reach will undoubtedly grow further through the course of 2025. Archie's Child Bereavement Service extended into Highlands and Tayside

Scotland and we now offer all aspects of this important service across all regions, including bereavement support training for professionals working with children and regular activity days so bereaved children can build friendships in a safe environment with others who have had similar experiences to their own. Referrals were up on the previous year with an especially encouragingly increase in direct requests from families, which points to growing awareness of our service and word of mouth recommendation from families we've helped.



also finds time to offer a supportive listening ear (and sometimes even a shoulder to cry on) for anxious parents. She regularly welcomes in emergency arrivals - shocked and terrified parents who are desperately trying to put on a brave face for their child are instantly reassured by her calm and welcoming manner. Gillian keeps a small stock of pyjamas and toiletries for families arriving with just the clothes they stand in and she also has a big stock of knitted toys in her office so she can invite nervous and shy siblings to choose a companion for their stay. Not all guests arrive in turmoil, many are regular visitors who spend a couple of nights here before attending regular check-ups or who attend for relatively simple elective procedures. Regardless of the circumstances, any hospital admission is a time of heightened emotion and having a home from home like the Archie Family Centre makes the world of difference during challenging times. The fact we can offer this is all thanks to Archie supporters - thank you so

business plan was to help ensure that every child with healthcare needs receives the support they deserve. A key part of this has been helping address the financial barriers Grant funding that too many families face in accessing help for NHS and resources for their child. For many this patients, staff starts with the absolute basics like funding the bus fare into hospital. For others it and facilities includes funding life-changing "extras" that

hundreds of children over the course of a year while others are individual applications for use on a daily basis at home and in school. We also funded quite a number of "extras" that most people expect and assume are provided by the NHS - things like funding wheelchair hire for children post-surgery or for young patients enduring energy-sapping treatment like chemotherapy who are too physically weak or exhausted to bear their own weight. Last year we saw a 43% increase in the number of funding applications received and appear odd, it reflects our focus on direct support to families for whom relatively low value higher value support for NHS paediatric services.
