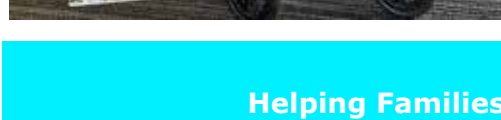
I hope you enjoy this little round up of some of our most recent support. Thank you so much for helping to make this, and so much more, possible.

Helping Families Enjoy Quality Moments Together During Very Challenging Times

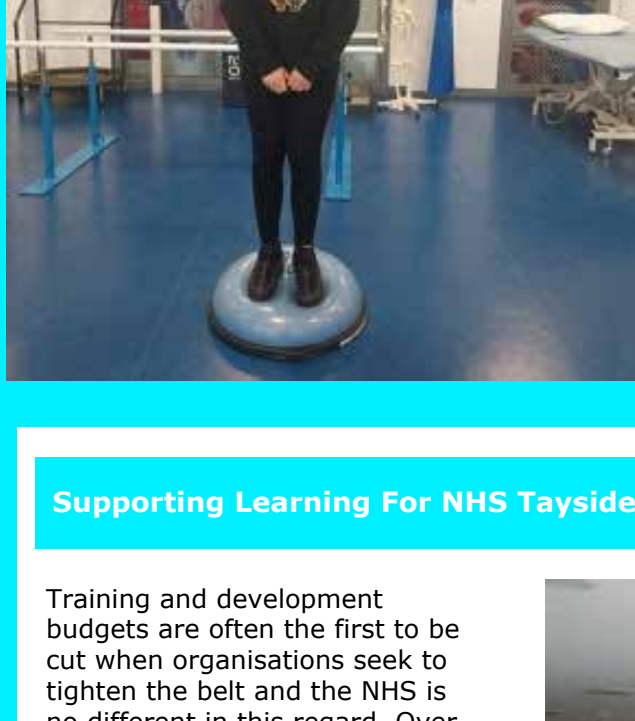

Very often quality time spent together and the memories made are the most precious gift and we are grateful to have the opportunity to help facilitate this for families in need. Harry and his family are a great example. As a baby Harry required corrective surgery on his heart, which sadly left him with further health complications requiring him to regularly attend at RACH. His most recent stay of 6 months has been his longest and hardest by far. His mum Claire said, "Being so far from our home in the Highlands and separated from Harry's two older brothers and all our family and support systems has been very difficult for both of us."



Thanks to supporters like you, The Archie Foundation have been here for Harry and his family for each of their many stays at RACH, providing support in a number of different ways. Claire makes good use of The Archie Family Centre (parent's accommodation) and really appreciates the support of the Play Team, including Archie Play Worker, Orla, who help keep Harry entertained and engaged, allowing her some much needed moments of rest. In addition to toys and resources The Archie Foundation funds arts and crafts sessions and music therapy, all of which Harry loves. We were even able to fund a day out for Harry and his brothers during his long 6 months in hospital so they could make up some of their lost, quality time together. Best of all, Harry went home just a couple of weeks ago!



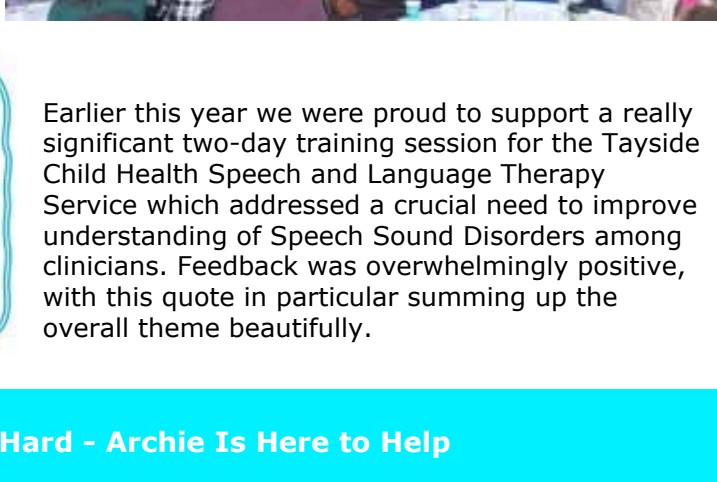
Archie & Physio Partnership Helped Alesha Become A Double Gold Winner in World Kick Boxing Championships!



Tight NHS budgets mean many departments are lacking vital resources to support their patients. The physiotherapy team at RACH recently applied to Archie to fund a BOSU balance trainer to support a young patient's rehabilitation following an injury. This support made an enormous difference for Alesha, who had a particular goal driving her rehab at home - getting back into her much-loved kick boxing. Alesha's dedication and diligent following of her rehab programme really paid off. Not only did she make a full recovery, Alesha also scooped TWO gold medals at the Kick-Boxing Association World Championships last month! Her physio, Alison, and all of us here at Archie couldn't be more proud to have helped her in this fabulous achievement.

Supporting Learning For NHS Tayside Speech & Language Therapy

Training and development budgets are often the first to be cut when organisations seek to tighten the belt and the NHS is no different in this regard. Over the last year we have seen a significant increase in applications to support staff learning, to help our NHS colleagues hone their skills and improve the services they deliver for young patients.



The Grief Journey Is Long and Hard - Archie Is Here to Help Practically And Emotionally

We regularly receive funding requests to support travel costs. These are most often from families struggling to access healthcare services but in one recent case this very basic and practical support enabled a bereaved family to make the most of the emotional support we offer. The death of a parent meant the children had to relocate to live with another family member. The importance of maintaining existing friendships and relationships during a very difficult time was recognised by all involved, but with child benefits and universal credit not yet having caught up with the dramatic change in parental responsibilities the daily 100-mile round-trip was all but impossible. A financial grant from The Archie Foundation bridged the gap until state support and new school places were secured, helping maintain a degree of routine and stability through a devastatingly difficult time, and crucially allowing the children to keep in touch with their old friends as they adjusted to their new life.

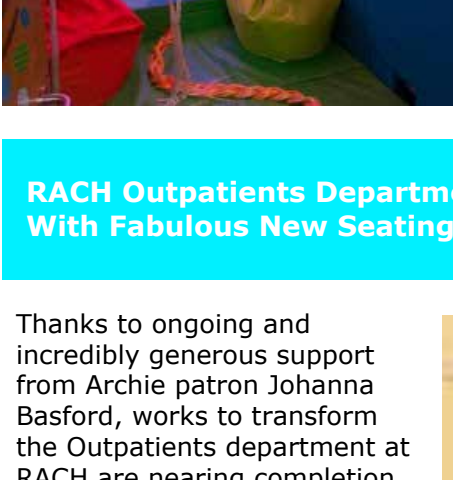


Tools, Resources, Experience and Compassion in Helping Bereaved Children



Demand for Archie's Child Bereavement Service continues to increase across all regions. In some cases our team engage during end-of-life-care, helping prepare the child (and often the whole family) for what is to come. Our Bereavement Support Workers have a raft of tools and resources which they adapt and use to meet the needs of the individuals they are working with, always allowing the child to set the pace. Jenny recently shared with us one of her favourite resources - a simple set of cuddly elephants. One of the elephants is given to the parent/carer, the other to the child. When the time comes to say goodbye, they swap elephants. The act of swapping, and being able to keep the parent's elephant, gives the child a continued physical link to their parent. In addition to working with the child and family Jenny also engages with the child's school, to help ensure a joined-up approach to supporting the child. And why elephants over any other cuddly toy? Because elephants never forget.

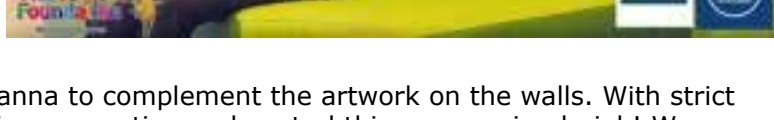
New Beanbags to Further Improve The Archie-Funded Sensory Room Within Highland Children's Unit



Last year, thanks to a generous donation, we were able to create a new sensory room at Highland Children's Unit. This safe space is in regular use and makes a huge difference for children who are feeling anxious or overwhelmed and in particular for children with additional support needs. Knowing how appreciated this facility is we were especially pleased to receive an application from our NHS colleagues for beanbags to further enhance the Sensory Room and to improve the Play Room within HCU. These additions provide improved comfort and relaxation for patients during their time in hospital with beanbags in particular, as opposed to more rigid seating, helping patient's feel safe and secure and improving their general wellbeing.

RACH Outpatients Department Revamp Nears Completion With Fabulous New Seating

Thanks to ongoing and incredibly generous support from Archie patron Johanna Basford, works to transform the Outpatients department at RACH are nearing completion. The final touches have been added to the waiting area with fabulous "new" seating. The team working on this wide-reaching project were really keen to refurbish and improve wherever possible so, rather than scrap the tired, old seats, we had them re-upholstered in bespoke fabric, specially designed by Johanna to complement the artwork on the walls. With strict NHS requirements around infection prevention and control this was no simple job! We contracted the work to local firm Luxous who enjoyed the project so much that they and our Project Coordinator, Sarah, made a lovely little video to showcase their beautiful work - you can watch it here.



Funding Milestone Gifts For Neonatal Babies and Their Families



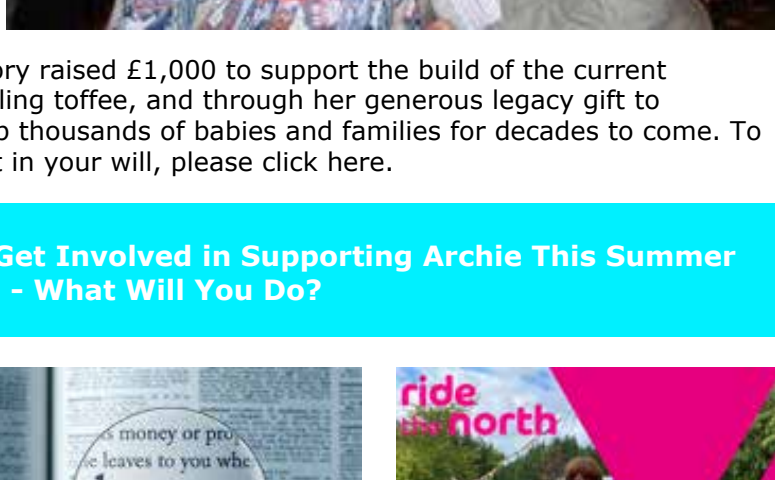
