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Last year, thanks to people like you, The Archie Foundation raised a grand total of £1,487,286. We invested £669,901 of this in ongoing support and services which directly benefitted 2,384 babies and children. We also made good progress towards our appeal targets, including our £2m Baird Appeal which now sits at £943,000.

Many of the children we helped last year required short term, emergency help. Others needed longer term support. And in some cases lives were saved thanks to specialist equipment, funded by Archie and our supporters.


Archie services directly helped

Enhancing Paediatric Healthcare & Helping Families Access It



Archie might be best known for "bricks and mortar" appeals to make hospital environments more child friendly and welcoming but improving and enhancing NHS resources and supporting NHS staff is academic if parents can't afford to bring their children to hospital. That's why our biggest focus right now is on supporting struggling families to access the healthcare and bereavement support their children need. Applications for our help have increased rapidly over the last couple of years and with the cost of living crisis making things even tougher for so many families we fully expect this to continue.

Applications for support can be made via our website by parents or by NHS staff. In addition to formal applications we are always happy to receive suggestions and ideas. Earlier this year a parent dropped by our office to ask if the Archie Toy Box at RACH could include some games and books for visually impaired children. With his guidance we did more than that and have now provided accessible resources for Royal Aberdeen Children's Hospital, Highland Children's Unit and Tayside Children's Hospital.



Archie's Child Bereavement Service Extended Into Tayside and Highlands

Last year saw record numbers of children in Grampian receive support from Archie's Child Bereavement Service and we extended the service into Tayside and the Highlands. In addition to directly supporting more bereaved children than ever we also trained nearly 500 professionals working with children and young people, to better equip them in supporting bereaved youngsters. The team are also now planning our bi-annual conference, which will take place in Inverness in September.






In January we introduced a new role that builds upon the success of our BBC Children in Need funded Bereavement Support Worker pilot. In addition to two Support Workers for the Grampian healthcare sector we now have a Support Worker for the Education sector in Grampian. Jane jumped at this new opportunity and has already delivered a number of training days, with many more booked and yet more requested not

to mention a busy case load of one to one support. Jane's role is possible thanks to generous funding from The JEllie Foundation.

Supporting Aberdeen Neonatal Unit and the New Baird Family Hospital



We're making good progress towards our £2m Baird Appeal target while continuing our important support and services at existing maternity and neonatal facilities. None of this would be possible without amazing people doing incredible things to raise funds. People like Davie Hill who is taking on an epic challenge for the neonatal unit that saved the life of his youngest daughter, Georgia "Boo".

Davie is setting off from Everest base camp and will scale four peaks before tackling the 20,210-foot-high 'Island Peak' glacier summit. Read more

about what David and his wife Angela say "certainly will be a challenge but in our eyes, not as challenging as what our Georgia Boo went through."

With most windows fitted and much of the building now insulated, clad and even painted, the Baird is looking great. As hoardings around the site have been removed for machinery access, we've started to get a feel for the scale of the building. At 26,000 sqm it is big! And each of the 1,000 rooms inside will be big. Big enough that in the new neonatal unit babies and their parents will have their own room.



That might not sound like much but compared with the cheek to jowl space that staff and families contend with just now, it will make the world of difference.
